Following Jesus Thank God for the Man on the Middle Cross Luke 23:34-45

I. Message

a. Jesus was forgiving - v.34

- i. Definition of forgiveness choosing not to bring up a grievance to require payment
- ii. Hebrews 10:16-18
- iii. Of course, this is what the cross was all about
 - 1. Reconciliation
 - 2. Forgiveness
 - 3. Burying our grievances against a holy God
 - 4. Separating them from us as far as east is from west
 - 5. Making the required payment for us
- iv. This was Jesus' attitude at His lowest moment humanly speaking
 - 1. "Don't make them pay!"
 - 2. "Choose not to remember this grievance!"
 - 3. Jesus was forgiving
 - 4. Everyone else is busy with lesser activities

b. The rulers were deriding – v.35

- i. Who had He "saved"?
 - 1. He saved the disciples from shipwreck in the storm Matthew 8
 - 2. He saved Peter from drowning Matthew 14
 - 3. He saved others from all kinds of illness Matthew 15:29-31
 - 4. He saved people from demonic oppression Matthew 12, 17
 - 5. He saved crowds from starvation Matthew 14 and Matthew 15
 - 6. He even saved people from death! Matthew 9 and John 11
 - a. And they HATED Him for these things!
 - b. They accused Jesus of being impotent, powerless
 - i. He had demonstrated His power repeatedly
 - ii. It was THEY who were powerless
 - iii. Clearly, HE had the power to save people!
- ii. So, why did He choose to not save Himself?
 - 1. John 12:23-28
 - 2. John 18:36
 - 3. Matthew 26:51-54

c. The soldiers were mocking – v.36-37

- i. There were only 2 options in response to Jesus:
 - 1. Pilate said He was accused of being the king of the Jews
 - 2. The Jewish leaders said He SAID He was the king of the Jews
 - 3. Herod and his soldiers dressed Him like a king to mock him

- 4. You had to respond in one of two ways:
 - a. Accept His sovereignty
 - b. Mock His sovereignty
 - c. Like many today, the soldiers chose to mock Him

d. The criminals were disputing – v.39-43

- i. How were they disputing or debating or conflicting?
- ii. <u>Criminal #1</u>
 - 1. Railed on Him v.39
 - 2. Questioned Him v.39
 - 3. Challenged Him v.39
- iii. <u>Criminal #2</u>
 - 1. Feared God v.40
 - 2. Recognized who Jesus was v.41
 - 3. Asked for Jesus' help v.42

iv. These two men serve as a great metaphor for how sinners respond

- 1. Some rail, question, challenge
- 2. Others fear, recognize, and ask for help
 - a. Fearing God's judgement (understand the problem)
 - b. Recognizing who Jesus is (agree you need help)
 - c. Asking for help (trust Him alone)
- 3. How have you responded like this man adjacent to, but so different than Jesus?

II. Conclusions

- a. Think about the thief on the cross
 - i. He never was baptized
 - ii. He was never discipled
 - iii. He never attended a church service
 - iv. He never even went to a Bible study
 - v. He probably didn't even know another believer
 - vi. He certainly never JOINED a church
 - vii. And yet, he made it!
 - 1. Why? "The man on the middle cross said I can come."
 - 2. That is the only answer. That is the only answer.
 - 3. Your ONLY credential
 - 4. My ONLY credential
 - 5. This criminal's ONLY credential is
 - 6. That the man on the middle cross said we could come!
 - 7. Imagine the gratitude he must have felt!

- b. Thank God for the Man on the Middle Cross
 - i. 2 Corinthians 9:15 "Thanks be unto God for his unspeakable gift."
 - ii. 8 specific ways to thank God for Jesus and salvation
 - 1. Colossians 1:12-14
 - a. Give thanks for the man on the middle cross
 - b. And the <u>#1 inheritance</u>, <u>#2 deliverance and #3 redemption</u> found in Him
 - 2. Colossians 3:15-17
 - a. Give thanks for the man on the middle cross
 - b. And the <u>#4 peace and #5 unity</u> found in Him
 - 3. Psalm 107:1-2
 - a. Give thanks for the man on the middle cross
 - b. And the <u>#6 goodness, #7 mercy and #8 victory</u> found in Him
 - c. May this Thanksgiving be about Jesus
 - i. But don't just be grateful
 - ii. GIVE THANKS!
